## MISGA Proposed Local Rules Adoption for Mixers

All proposed rule and Local Rule adoption are in the interest of pace of play.

- 1. Use Rule 21.2 Maximum Score
  - a. Set Maximum score for each player at net double bogey.
  - b. When a player reaches net double bogey on any hole pick up, they do not need to hole out to post the score.

## **Local Rules**

# 1. Model Local Rule E-5 Out of Bounds/Lost Ball in lieu of Stroke and Distance

When a player's ball cannot be found or is *known or virtually certain* to be *out of bounds*, the player may proceed as follows rather than proceeding under *stroke and distance*.

For **two penalty strokes**, the player may take relief by *dropping* the original ball or a *substituted ball* in this *relief area* (see Rule 14.3).

Note --- there is full page of text defining the Relief Area that that can be seen in the pro shop.

#### 2. K-1 Maximum Time for All or Part of Round

Model Local Rule K-1

"If a group finishes the round more than the starting interval behind the group in front (15 minutes) and over [specify time, for example, 4 hours 30 minutes] from the time of starting all players in the group are disqualified for any prizes."

### Full definition of Local Rule E-1

"When a player's ball has not been found or is <u>known or virtually certain</u> to be <u>out of bounds</u>, the player may proceed as follows rather than proceeding under <u>stroke and distance</u>.

For two penalty strokes, the player may take relief by <u>dropping</u> the original ball or another ball in this <u>relief</u> area (see Rule 14.3):

Two Estimated Reference Points:

- a. **Ball Reference Point**: The point where the original ball is estimated to have:
  - Come to rest on the course, or
  - Last crossed the edge of the <u>course</u> boundary to go <u>out of bounds</u>.

b. **Fairway Reference Point**: The point of fairway of the hole being played that is nearest to the ball reference point, but is not nearer the <u>hole</u> than the ball reference point.

For purposes of this Local Rule, "fairway" means any area of grass in the <u>general area</u> that is cut to fairway height or less.

If a ball is estimated to be <u>lost</u> on the <u>course</u> or last crossed the edge of the <u>course</u> boundary short of the fairway, the fairway reference point may be a grass path or a teeing ground for the hole being played cut to fairway height or less.

Size of Relief Area Based on Reference Points: Anywhere between:

- A line from the <u>hole</u> through the ball reference point (and within two <u>club-lengths</u> to the outside of that line), and
- A line from the <u>hole</u> through the fairway reference point (and within two <u>clublengths</u> to the fairway side of that line).

But with these limits:

Limits on Location of Relief Area:

- Must be in the general area, and
- Must not be nearer the <u>hole</u> than the ball reference point.

Once the player puts a ball in play under this Local Rule:

 The original ball that was <u>lost</u> or <u>out of bounds</u> is no longer <u>in play</u> and must not be played. • This is true even if the ball is found on the <u>course</u> before the end of the threeminute search time (see <u>Rule 6.3b</u>).

But the player may not use this option to take relief for the original ball when:

- That ball is known or virtually certain to have come to rest in a penalty area, or
- The player has played another ball provisionally under penalty of <u>stroke and distance</u> (see <u>Rule 18.3</u>).

A player may use this option to take relief for a provisional ball that has not been found or is known or virtually certain to be out of bounds.

Penalty for Playing Ball from a Wrong Place in Breach of Local Rule: <u>General Penalty</u> Under <u>Rule 14.7a</u>."
