WHAT BEING A MISGA ASSOCIATE MEANS TO YOU

MISGA this year is issuing "Associate" wallet cards to participating golfers as a means of raising funds for the operation of the MISGA program. The \$1.50 per Associate charged to your club replaces the 10 per cent which MISGA has customarily collected from Mixer entry fees. The new system has advantages for individual golfers and MISGA clubs as well as for the MISGA organization.

Being a MISGA Associate identifies you as an active senior golfer who supports MISGA's program of expanding golfing friendships and experiences. It also qualifies you to share in the personal benefits of MISGA's Mixers and tournaments and enjoy guest privileges at reciprocating clubs. Without the 10 per cent "cut," all the money from Mixer entry fees will go for prizes.

Granting of guest privileges without payment of green fee varies from club to club, and usually is limited to the club's regular senior guest day. For information on making advance arrangements for guest privileges at a particular club, contact the club's MISGA representative or golf shop.

MISGA clubs benefit from increased revenue for their seniors program when they sell the Associate cards above cost. They also will develop rosters of Associates which will be filed with MISGA and exchanged between MISGA clubs.

MISGA, in turn, will be a stronger and better-run organization with the new revenue program and availability of club rosters.

NEW ACCESSORIES FOR MISGA ASSOCIATES

With the Associates program launched so effectively this year our members have asked for additional items that would give us a higher recognition level as an organization. We are glad to report that some top grade golf accessories can now be offered at substantial discount prices for this purpose. All items bear the MISGA logo.

Dave Watson, Liaison Committee chairman, has arranged to supply these items on a consignment basis. Club representatives who wish to take advantage of this offer should order at least a minimum supply of one dozen of each item they wish to stock. The larger clubs are ordering up to three dozen.

The first step would be to discuss this program with your club professional. His cooperation is essential. Methods of sales vary. Some will stock and sell with a small markup. Some club representatives will sell directly with agreement of the pro.

Each club representative present at the spring meeting at Prince Georges C.C. received one of the shirts being offered. It contains a comfortable mixture of 50% cotton and 50% polyester and compares favorably with \$16 to \$20 shirts on the market.

Cost to clubs are: Shirts \$7.85; caps \$3.70; hats \$3.70; sweaters \$11.00; and towels 15" x 26" \$1.90. LIAISON COMMITTEE

The new liaison committee is now organized and functioning under the chairmanship of Dave Watson (Argyle C.C). Liaison personnel will occasionally ask to attend your Mixer events; help in improving organizational or operating guidelines to assist your MISGA program and improve communications generally. All MISGA clubs are urged to conduct their programs in accordance with the "Mixer Guidelines" and "Goals and Objectives for MISGA Clubs" (November 1979).

The Board has asked the committee to evaluate its responsiveness to clubs' needs, determine the effectiveness of our goals and objectives, and prepare reports that will be helpful in evaluating MISGA as an organization.

MAPS

Each club representative received a brochure of maps which uniformly direct our Mixer participants to the MISGA clubs on their schedules. Through the fine efforts of Jack Weber (Kenwood C.C.) the maps were distributed at the spring meeting at Prince Georges C.C. Clubs who have not received their maps should contact Al Hagen. The Board looks for suggestions that help eliminate confusion and assist in the organization of Mixers.

NEW 1980 GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

These are some of the things some MISGA clubs have put into practice which other clubs should strive for in our progress toward improving our club seniors program and the operation of MISGA for the betterment and greater enjoyment of golf by all:

- 1. Issue billfold size schedules of your senior events.
- 2. Designate a liaison representative and advise Dave Watson of his identity.
- 3. Establish a regular schedule of "Senior Member-Guest Tournaments."
- 4. A MISGA bag tag bearing the player's name on every Associate's golf bag.
- 5. A practice of calling Wally Sager, director of Operations, ASAP (229-6295) whenever your club has difficulty filling its Mixers.
- 6. For the larger Mixers, encourage a sandwich-type buffet to expedite serving lunch.
- 7. Encourage a new type of season-long competition for seniors within your club called Seniors Event Participation Award (or Sweepstakes).
- 8. The purpose of Mixers is enhanced by the serving of coffee and donuts before a Mixer is played. This practice should be a reciprocal matter.

EASTERN SHORE-WESTERN SHORE MIXER

The highly successful two-day exchange Mixer between the Eastern and Western shores held last year are being repeated with 72 seniors traveling to the Eastern Shore May 22-23 and 80 from there coming to the Western Shore Sept. 2-4.

There will be a 1 P.M. shotgun at Green Hill in Salisbury on May 22 and a 9:30 shotgun at Nassawanga in Snow Hill the next day. Play will be bestball of foursome, ABCD, 80% handicap.

There will be a dinner at Green Hill on May 22 and a buffet lunch following play at Nassawanga the next day. Accommodations at the Sheraton-Salisbury include a buffet breakfast.

A simultaneous Ladies Tournament will be held at Nassawanga May 22 and Green Hill the next day.

Green Hill's Norman Gotterdam is Peninsula coordinator with Nassawanga's Maurice Peacock his associate.

Four courses will be utilized when the second half of the Mixer moves to the Western Shore, according to Wally Sager, Western coordinator. Half of the Eastern seniors will play Kenwood and half will play Argyle Sept. 2. The next day Montgomery Village and Potomac Valley will be used in the same fashion. The visitors will stay at Kenwood overnight.

WILLIAM AND WRIGHT WIN SPRING FLING

Gil Williams of U. of Maryland G.C. and Orville Wright of Montgomery Village won low gross and low net, respectively, in the third annual Spring Fling at Callaway Gardens.

"Everyone really enjoyed themselves and spoke highly of the quality of food, service, golf and accommodations," Chairman Wally Sager reported. "The weather was great, too."

Gil's 76-84—160 beat runner-up Larry Wissinger of Argyle by 11 strokes. On the net side, Orville's 63-74—137 beat Gordon Calvert of Talbot by five strokes.

NEW FORMAT FOR FALL CHAMPIONSHIP

The rapid growth of MISGA in five years has necessitated the introduction of three qualifying tournaments for the championship, which will be defended by Greencastle at Argyle on Sept. 26.

Fifteen Washington area clubs will qualify at Brooke Manor, Aug. 14. Rain date Aug. 21. Ten Baltimore-Western Maryland clubs, including Greencastle and Hobbits Glen, will qualify Aug. 12 at Greencastle. Date and site of Eastern Shore qualifying has not been set.

As before, play will be two-man best-ball, with each two-man team having a minimum combined handicap of 25. Two teams from each club will qualify for the championship, based on combined net scores.

In the event any players on the qualifying teams are unable to participate in the championship, according to chairman Wally Sager, the club may substitute other players only if they participated in the qualifying tournament.

A different club has won the championship in each of the four years since the first one in 1976. In order, they have been Eaglehead, Manor, Chartwell and Greencastle.

Greencastle set a record 36-hole score of 116, 25 under par, in winning last year, when the championship was played over two courses, Kenwood and Montgomery Village. It beat second place Tantallon by nine shots.

Paul Graybar and John Wheeler teamed up for net 56, 14 under, at Kenwood, while John Flaherty and Dick Mehaffey turned in a 60, 11 under, at M.V.

Lowest net scores at each course were Graybar-Wheeler's 56 at Kenwood and 58 by Al Hagen-Al Slater of Lakewood at M.V. Lowest gross: Flaherty-Mehaffey's 70 at M.V. and 72 by Hunt Valley's Vern Mergl-Tom Ogilvie at Kenwood.

GUIDELINES FOR MIXER EVENTS

- Each MISGA club shall have a designated representative for administrating its program.
 Upon receipt of the annual MIXER pairings, club representatives shall establish mutually acceptable "home and away" playing dates and send them to the MISGA Operation Director, post on senior bulletin board and publish in club newsletter.
- 2. Representatives may designate team captain(s) for each event if he so desires. Assistants, as required, may be appointed by the representative or his captain. Each representative shall notify the representative of the club with whom he is scheduled with the names, addresses and phone numbers of the person responsible for mixers.
- 3. Post notices on seniors' bulletin board. Prepare a notice announcing the Mixer event including the date, names of host and guest clubs, starting time, etc. A sign-up sheet should be posted at each club a minimum of two weeks before the mixer date. It should contain a column for name, handicap and phone number.
- 4. Coordinate with the Pro shop Furnish list of guests and members, arrange for carts, gift certificates and starting times.
- Coordinate with club manager Number staying for lunch, status of reciprocal chit signing and approximate time players will return to the club house.
- 6. Coordinate with starter Provide parings both guests and members. Establish starting times and starting holes.
- 7. Mixer event details:
 - (a) Type of competition shall be determined by the host club. Two man, three man or four man teams may be formed depending on the number of players from each club. Each team should have at least one player from the host club. Visiting club "rep" shall notify the host club "rep" a minimum of 48 hours in advance of the match with the names and handicaps of the visiting players.
 - (b) A fee of \$2.00 will be collected from each player all of which will be used for prizes in the form of gift certificates from the host Pro shop. Prizes will be awarded to approximately 25% of the participants. Only one prize per person will be awarded. In case of ties prizes should be divided equally between tied teams.
 - (c) Persons playing additional holes after completing 18 holes of competition, before turning in their card, will be disqualified from winning prizes. Cards are to be turned in to the scorer upon completion of competition by host player.
 - (d) Host club may disqualify players not turning in their cards within 5 hours after start of contest.
 - (e) All seniors must carry a MISGA Associate Membership card to participate in Mixer events.
 - (f) Club representatives should take every precaution to assure that seniors who play in mixer events carry a current USGA handicap.
 - (g) Club representatives should make every effort to have a minimum of 12 players for each mixer. If 12 or more players can not be supplied by one or both clubs, players from other clubs should be invited to fill the quota. This will result in a much more successful Mixer. Whenever clubs have difficulty getting 12 players the MISGA Operation Director should be notified. Invite all seniors to become members of MISGA. Host club "reps" that limit the number of guests permitted to play in a Mixer should notify the visiting club of this limitation 30 days prior to the contest.
- 8. Miscellaneous suggestions:
 - (a) Prepare score cards in advance, with appropriate handicap notations. Determine in advance who should collect the \$2.00 entry fee.
 - (b) Host club should greet visitors on arrival, instruct them on parking, unloading of clubs, registration, location of facilities, etc. Coffee and pastries for players prior to play are suggested.
 - (c) Two officials should tee off first so that they will be available to post scores.
 - (d) Determine how many will stay for lunch at registration and advise club management. A sandwich buffet or other light buffet is recommended.
 - (e) Carts should be shared with host and guest players to the extent possible. Sharing cart with members of the same club should be avoided.
 - (f) Mixer members are urged to remain for lunch and the distribution of prizes.
 - (g) The host should provide visitors with the most direct and/or easiest route to his club. Maps will be provided to all club representatives.
 - (h) To reduce the number of no-shows to a minimum, appoint a telephone committee to call your players the day before each match. Instruct your seniors to notify the club representative as soon as he knows he will be unable to play.
 - (i) Try to get your Pro involved to the extent you feel practical.
 - (j) Sell bag tags at all events. Encourage each member to have a MISGA bag tag on his bags.
