

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

As we begin a new year, I want to share with you my view on the condition of MISGA. I believe MISGA is in great shape! Last year we generated \$1,118,395 in total revenue from our mixers, qualifiers and tournaments -- a record. The



total number of mixers is at an all time high as is the total number of participants. It looks like the Club Reps are doing things right.

Look for membership levels to start increasing. I say this because the Baby Boomers, those born between 1946 and 1964, are beginning to turn 55. I also anticipate an

increase in the number of member clubs, particularly on the Eastern Shore.

Participation in the Fall Frolics is starting to turn the corner. I suspect membership levels over the past decade were not sufficient to support three events a year. Action by the Board of Directors to limit Fall Frolics to two events a year makes sense. If and when demand returns, we can add events accordingly. The Fall Frolics are a good value and a great way to meet people from other clubs.

However, MISGA is not without its problems. Three areas come to mind which require our attention.

Certain clubs in and around the Washington, DC and Baltimore beltways must deal with traffic congestion which makes travel difficult. A 45-minute commute of five years ago, now takes twice as long and it won't get any better. Other clubs have excessive distances to cover in getting to mixers. Either way, it's taking too long to get there. As a result we have to re-examine how we do our scheduling and make appropriate changes.

MISGA associates are refusing to attend mixers and other events at courses which they deem to be undesirable. This attitude runs counter to the spirit of MISGA. It has no place in the organization! Remember this: some clubs have better course layouts than others and some have better facilities, but on the whole., each one represents an enjoyable day of golf.

MISGA continues to receive criticism for casually applying the rules and etiquette of golf and failing to comply with the USGA Handicap System. These areas will receive the continued attention of the Ad Hoc Committee on Rules and Handicaps with particular emphasis on getting associates into the habit of posting scores. Out of fairness to all, we want to make sure that our handicaps reflect our playing ability.

I look forward to serving as your president, and I pledge to promote the goals and objectives of MISGA. I'll see you on the golf course.

JONATHAN'S LANDING


Jonathan's Landing Golf Course, in Magnolia, Delaware, opened for play in 1996 as a links course with two-foot-high grass covering most of the rough area. Thankfully, this heather-type grass was eliminated shortly thereafter. By the spring of 2001 Jonathan's had developed two courses: the championship Point Course with 18 holes at 6,657 yards and the Cape Course with 9 holes at 2,637 yards.



The front nine of the Point Course is noted for its severe, rolling greens while the back nine offers many water hazards and lengthy fairways. The black tees are a challenge for the best golfers.

The Fourth Hole

The nine-hole Cape Course has six par fours of typical length and three par threes, all with ample and challenging greens.



The club offers a large practice green, indoor and outdoor driving range, pro shop and snack bar. The new club house is designed to replicate the features of Delaware's historic Port Mahon

Lighthouse. It has spacious dining facilities to accommodate large gatherings.

This past season Jonathan's became increasingly popular with area golfers due to its friendly management and staff and because of the well-kept golf course.

We at Jonathan's welcome MISGA golfers and hope you enjoy our club. We look forward to a great 2002 season!

MISGA SPRING FLING 2002

Returning to the "SHORE"

Don't miss out. Get your application in early.

No entry will be accepted if postmarked after the April 6, 2002 closing date.

The Spring Fling 2002 is scheduled for Monday and Tuesday, May 6th and May 7th. It will be played at Ocean City Golf and Yacht Club's Seaside and Newport Bay courses which will host both the men and ladies. <u>Soft spikes are required on these courses</u>.

<u>The November 1. 2001 handicap index will be used.</u> For the men, 100% of handicap will apply on both days at both courses. On Seaside par 5s you will record 1 net score, par 4s record 2 net scores and par 3s record 3 net scores. On Newport Bay the format will be a Scramble. Each golfer will use two tee shots per side. Only one tearn score will be recorded. The format for the ladies will be 2 better balls net of the foursome at 100% of handicap for 18 and 9 hole golfers on both days at both courses.

Every effort will be made to schedule couples to each play on the same course on the same day.

Check-in on Monday, May 6th, at both courses, will begin at 10:30 AM followed by a shotgun start at 12:30 PM. A snack lunch will be available and is included in the entry fee. On Tuesday, May 7th, at both courses, cheek-in will be underway by 8:00 AM with a shotgun start scheduled for 9:00 AM. Coffee and donuts will be available prior to golf and lunch will be at the club after play has ended. These are also included in the entry fee. Please try to be checked in at least 30 minutes prior to tee time each day.

For those desiring overnight accommodations for Monday night, May 6th, arrangements have been made at the Clarion Resort Fontainebleau Hotel (Formerly The Sheraton), 10100 Coastal Highway, Ocean City, Maryland. Room fees, as applicable, are included in the rates shown on the entry form. <u>Cancellations must be made no later than April 29. 2002 to insure a full refund.</u> If you wish to make other arrangements you may contact the Clarion Hotel at (410) 524-3535 or 1-800-638-2100.

A confirmation card will be sent to you within one week following receipt of your entry. You will also receive a letter by April 22, 2002 outlining the arrangements the committee has made for you. If you are car-pooling with other golfers please inform us on your entry form.

The banquet will be held at the Clarion Hotel on Monday, May 6th at 7:30 PM. Dress for dinner is casual and jackets are required for the men.

For the non-golfing ladies, we will have a Tour Guide for trips to selected places of interest on Monday and Tuesday. The price includes lunch both days plus coffee and donuts on Tuesday.
