If club reps would verify, as a minimum, that all home and away mixer winners have posted their correct scores, most of the problems would vanish. The MISGA goal is for members to post all rounds. Based on personal experience, I found that checking scores revealed that only a few members were not posting scores. Checking is not an arduous task. The checking and notifying the player is part of the education of MISGA golfers.

I firmly believe that within a few months this action could make MISGA a more enjoyable experience for all of us.

Then clicking the following:

"Your Handicap Index"

"What's Your Handicap Index?"

"Maryland, Delaware, or Pennsylvania"

"Search for individual"...(enter name)...

"Submit"

Golfnet is the major handicap system used in the Mid Atlantic Section of the PGA. Only 4 MISGA clubs are not on Golfnet at this time.

Letter to the Editor

On 10 June 2003 I endured an unfortunate round of golf at a MISGA event at Sparrows Point. On the first tee we discovered we had been paired with a gentleman who said he had just taken up golf "one week earlier." He was assigned a handicap of 30, but it could have just as easily been 50. On the first tee he topped his drive about 20 yards into heavy rough. It took us approximately 10 - 15 minutes to locate that drive. This was repeated for the next 18 holes. A round that started at 9:00 a.m. dragged on and on for 6 1/2 hours until it ended at 3:30 p.m. When we arrived in the clubhouse for the luncheon all the food had been served and people were ready to leave as soon as our scorecard was posted. Fortunately, the Sparrows Point people were kind enough to see that we were fed.

I am reporting the above in the hope that MISGA can take some steps to assure that someone can't just show up at a MISGA event and begin learning how to play golf. I was from Crofton and my cart partner was the Sparrows Point host. I was never aware what club the gentleman in question was associated with. At no point did my host make any attempt to deal with the situation. My only recourse of action was to try to speed up play, but this was an exercise in futility and only further irritated me.

Not knowing how to deal with the situation as it unfolded, I would hope that maybe some guidance could be provided in a MISGAGRAM on some method of preventing/handling this type of occurrence. I have always immensely enjoyed the MISGA events both for the golf and the company it provides, but would hope my experience can somehow be used in a positive manner to establish guidelines/procedures in dealing with situations of this type.

Thanks again for the opportunity to vent.

Editor's Note:

Tom's letter points out one of the few complaints that I hear as we play in MISGA Mixers, mainly **slow play!**

On page two of this month's MISGAGRAM is an excellent suggestion from our Handicap Committee that addresses "Picking Up" and speeding up play. If all of us follow the suggestion I'm sure it will speed play.

Handicap Issue: Scorecard postings in "picking up" situations

It is helpful to know what score must be posted for holes where a golfer picks up his/her ball. This should encourage us to pick up more often, which should assist in speeding play. That would be a good thing.

To speed play correctly, it is important to know what score must be posted on holes which are not completed (where the golfer starts the hole but picks up the ball before finishing the hole) or on holes which are not played at all (such as at the end of a match play event where the match is over before the last hole is completed and the competitors do not want to finish the round).

According to the USGA's "brown book," titled "The USGA Handicap System" (which contains all the USGA's handicap rules), when a golfer picks up during the play of a hole, he must record a score for that hole which is his/her "most likely score" for that hole in that situation. That score would be the number of strokes already taken plus the number of strokes the golfer would take to complete the hole more than half the time in that situation.

For example, if the golfer picks up from the fringe of, or just off, the green or a short chip or pitch from the green, the golfer would assume that he would take three more strokes to complete the hole: the pitch or chip plus two putts (one putt greens are not most likely). The scoring gets tricky when the golfer picks up when on the green. Usually the golfer records two putts. On short putts, the golfer might want to putt out to achieve a one putt green, if to do so would not unduly delay the group's play of the hole and the course. In situations where the golfer picks up very early, such as after hitting his first ball out of bounds and his provisional drive is behind a tree, the most likely score on a four par hole would appear to be three, plus a chip to the fairway, plus one (or two or three?) more strokes to get to the green (depending on what is most likely for that golfer), plus two putts.

(The most likely score cannot, of course, exceed the equitable stroke control score for that hole, for score posting purposes.)

When holes are not played at all, such as at the end of a match when the match is over before the last hole, or when the golfer is fatigued and needs to retire from play, the score to be entered on the scorecard for those holes is "par plus," which is: par for the hole, plus the number of strokes given to the golfer on that hole by the handicap system.

Hopefully, this brief outline of scoring in pick-up situations will help us all speed our play everywhere, and especially in MISGA events. Have a good round!

Fall Frolics-2003 & Fall Frolic 2004

The Sea Trail 2003 Fall Frolic scheduled for November 2-November 7, 2003 is filling up fast. We still have room for a few more golfers. I would urge those of you who are considering going to please submit your applications before all of the spots are filled.

The response we received for the Fripp Island Fall Frolic scheduled for November 7-November 14, 2003 was overwhelming. We now have a waiting list. Normally, we receive a small percentage of cancellations and we anticipate that some of those on the current waiting list will be able to make the trip. However, we can't make any promises! Those on the waiting list will fill any cancellations we receive **subject to the type of accommodations requested**.

Next year I am looking at a possible additional Fall Frolic for 2004, subject to an expression of interest from MISGA members. I have received what I consider to be an excellent package offer to go to the Dominican Republic (Amber Coast) in October or November of 2004. The trip will be for either seven (7) or eight days (8). The trip includes golf, airport, resort and golf course transportation and deluxe accommodations at a 4 star "all-inclusive" beachfront resort. Both trips include five (5) rounds of golf played on the Robert Trent Jones "Playa Grande" or "Playa Dorada" courses overlooking the Atlantic. The trip includes - Shared carts and caddies, all-inclusive food and **national drinks.** That's correct; all drinks whether they are with or without alcohol! Air Fare is separate & arrangements for airfare will be the individual's responsibility.

The seven-day package includes two nights at the Puerto Plata village resort and five (5) nights at the Bahia Principe Resort (Hacienda Club Privileges). The seven-day package cost range is \$1199 per person based on double occupancy per golfer or \$849 per person for a non-golfer based on double occupancy (Tours are available at \$25 per person). The eight-day package is priced at \$1399 per golfer dbl.occ. and \$999 per non-golfer dbl. Occ.. It will include 5 days of golf and 3 days of optional or included tours, cart fees, all meals and national drinks!

I am looking for an expression of interest from our membership. The trip will be limited to a <u>maximum of 64 participants</u>.
